1. Chairman's report

- **Executive summary**
 - Pirates consolidate themselves as a club and have had some success to date.
 - Participation numbers in the summer and junior competitions is encouraging. Southern Touch needs to continually promote Touch in schools as an alternative to other mainstream sports.
 - Participation numbers in the winter competition increased to a record number of participating teams
 - The spread of elite players amongst the division one teams is still a concern.
 - The club structure and ongoing success of clubs must be linked to strong leadership and a focus on development (both junior and senior participation)
 - Southern Touch again won the state cup, however failed to win the men's 30 and mixed division.
 - Southern Touch representative numbers in Tasmanian team (senior level) is of a concern. It is recognised however that Tasmania Touch teams must enter worthwhile competition to attract our best players.
 - Southern Touch continues to provide quality players for the Tasmanian under 18, 15s and 12 aged divisions at national competitions.
 - Southern Touch suffered the usual referee availability problems throughout the summer season. Strategies must be developed to address this situation.
 - The Southern touch web site is under development with the new version scheduled for release in October.
 - Significant work has commenced in developing a comprehensive marketing and promotional plan. Southern Touch is targeting the beginning October to release the plan for comment.
 - Southern Touch showed positive financial management returning a profit of \$22'652. 00 for the 2005/06 financial year.

2. Financial Report

Southern Touch returned a profit of \$22'652.00 for the 2005-06 financial year. This is a significant result on top of last year's profit of \$1717.33

Increased team affiliation fees as decided by the Southern Touch board prior to season 2005-06 is solely responsible for the increased income. All other areas of revenue and expenditure remained comparable to last year.

While the above result is an extremely pleasing one for Southern Touch, we enter an unsteady time with the Tasmanian Touch administration contract that feeds almost \$15'000 per annum into the total revenue which will be withdrawn later in the year.

Southern Touch will need to seek alternative forms of revenue, while still maintaining and increasing its strong senior and junior competition numbers to fulfill future revenue goals.

3. General Managers Report

A famous Collingwood President once said "What a big week it has been in football" well the same can be said for Southern Touch Inc. over the 2005-06 financial year.

Southern Touch witnessed the departure of an employee, General Manager Michael Best, who dedicated valuable time to the association and contributed to its ongoing success.

Replacing myself as the development office Katherine Dent joined in October 2005 and for someone who had no previous touch experience has successfully filled the administration, competition and development role.

Uncertainty faces Southern Touch in the coming months as the contractual arrangement with the Tasmanian Touch Association looks like coming to an end in November 2006 to make way for a nationally controlled full time Game Development Officer, as agreed upon by Tasmanian affiliates under the new Unitary Model set in place by Touch Football Australia. The loss of this contract will have a severe impact on Southern Touch's financial position and more importantly its staffing structure in the coming year.

Touch football development sessions were conducted at a number of primary and secondary schools over the past year and is now starting to be an established core-sporting unit in many schools curriculum.

Participation levels for all competitions summer, winter and junior showed positive growth indicating that Southern Touch continues to provide a successful, well managed and member focused sporting association. Winter 2006 team numbers significantly increased from 44 in 2005 to 57, the highest number achieved for a winter season.

The co arrangement with Tasmanian Rugby and Rugby Park as a satellite venue yet again proved popular among mixed teams during summer, and continues to be a viable means to accommodate the sports growth, particularly in the social mixed competition.

Growing pressure continues in the referee department of the association. Team growth to referee ratio is widening, and at many times throughout the summer season matches were left with one referee. The quality of referee produced by Southern Touch continues to be of a very high standard and number increases will be dependent on a) Southern Touch providing as many Technical Referee Courses as it can manage throughout the year, b) getting kids involved through the junior competitions, then introducing them to senior competition and c) the everyday park touch player coming and having a go, one game on a night they play!

Club development continues to be an issue and current volunteers that manage first division sides in men and women's for Phantoms, Condors, Hurricanes, Pirates, and Tigers should all be congratulated and encouraged to continue their work with the elite teams.

Women's first division touch took a step in the right direction during summer with the induction of a sixth side to the elite women's first division in the "Bullets".

Although seemingly outclassed at times throughout the season the dedication to learn and improve by all members of the Bullets side paid dividends going into the second half of the summer season with established first division teams finding the new team – not easy beats!!

Exciting developments in the IT area with steps taken to upgrade and completely remodel the Southern Touch website. Working in conjunction with Sporting pulse Australia, the new website will ultimately improve the image, efficiency and provide members with a comprehensive online service. It is anticipated that the new website will be operational prior to Summer Season 2006-07.

Mixed touch grand finals were trialed for the first time on the Friday night preceding Grand Final day and over all supporting accolades were received; this format will be adopted for summer 2006-07.

Tasmanian State Cup honors were retained by Southern Touch once more with impressive grand final performances by the Men's 20s, Women's Open and Men's Open divisions who all defeated their northern opponents. The men's 30s, Mixed and women's 20s teams all made direct pathways to their grand finals on the Sunday but suffered losses at the hands of Launceston Touch. On the Tasmanian Touch count back system Southern Touch were victorious and maintained the WIN Tasmanian State Cup trophy for 2006.

The annual dinner of Southern Touch moved venues to offer an exciting, cost effective and refreshing appeal to regular touch ball goers while generating interest from new teams and players. The university of Tasmania's "UNI Bar" provided the facilities and "Dr Fink" had healthy numbers dancing till the early hours. Southern Touch will again book this venue for the upcoming season and invites all members to come along and let your hair down in 2007...

Southern Touch strives to provide excellent service, facilities and well managed touch competitions and for season 2005-06 this has been achieved and we all know there are areas subject to improvements but overall a job well done by all staff, volunteers and of the course the board of management.

4. Development Officer

Having been the in the position of Development Officer and new to the sport of Touch Football it is obvious that Touch Football is taking off with an increase in participants right across the spectrum including referees and team entries.

Southern Touch continued with its alignment with Active After Schools Network to conduct school sessions. The Active After Schools involve getting kids active while promoting Touch Football as an enjoyable and social sport. Howrah Primary School showed interest in first term for the grades 3-6. The younger groups worked on the simple skills such as running and passing where as the older groups were able to begin the invasion type games to get an idea of how the game is played and hopefully prepare them for high school competitions.

After first term we focused our attention to primarily run AASC for grade 5/6's and above due to the lack of ability to involve touch football skills and games for the children any younger. Second term Warrane Primary School were serviced by AASC and although the group was very small they were able to get to the game phase. They were very successful at learning the rules of the game and putting the skills learnt to game play.

Term 3 looks forward to more schools getting involved after successful promotion from AASC and Southern Touch itself with schools such as Brent Street Primary and Lansdowne Crescent School already booking in for their block of Touch Football.

Junior competition in 2005 produced similar team numbers as the previous year with 89 teams involved across the age groups. It is hard to say whether there will be an increase in 2006 however through the interest generated among the schools network by delivering AASC, the likelihood is that there may be an increase.

The summer competition 05/06 also remained stable with similar numbers of 146 teams. Friday night matches continued for first and second division only and continued to be a success. The aim is to influence outside teams to come along for a night and watch the top divisions play in what is regarded as the fastest and most competitive of divisions, while creating an alternative for the regular elite players.

Mixed Finals were also held on the Friday night before grand final day to test run its benefits for teams and their members playing two finals a day. The Friday night mixed finals were a success and after much praises will now be run the Friday night before the grand final day in the 06/07 season.

Southern Touch ran a level-one referee course for the many that were interested in getting involved in refereeing Touch Football. Some of the new referee's on board include Erica Bessell, David Bessell, Aaron Jones, Simon Bird, Ian Fiddaman, Brendan Fisher, Lachlan Greve, Shannon Grubb and Fiona Breen. Ron Robinson is also a new referee from Western Australia who brings years of experience and has his level 6 Senior badge.

Three junior referees that need special mention on their dedication to Southern Touch and improvements are Jeremy Edwards, Kieran Rogers and Trent Cornish. These boys are now confidently refereeing open aged matches.

Tom Pilkington also needs to be mentioned for his dedication and ability to referee at a high level after dedicating his time to referee at the NSW County Championships this year.

Representative Touch again proved successful for Southern Touch with another State Cup trophy win against the other regions. The following teams took it all the way for Southern Touch including Men's Open, Women's Open and Men's 20's. The Girl's 20's team came close, but again for successive years lost in a drop off. There were some individual successes from Southern Touch including Jack Riewoldt gaining Best & Fairest and Player of the Final Awards in the Men's 20s division and Chante Ling was awarded with Player of the Final in the Women's Open final.

I would like to make special mention to the following players who participated in the National Touch League that was held in Coffs Harbour earlier this year. These players are great representatives of what Southern Touch Football aims for its participants. Catherine Oliver and Kate Cowen both participated in the Women's 20's team, Adrian Thompson, Matt Cerruty, Will Bibby and Duncan Bain with the Men's 20's and Emma Haines and Ben Langford gaining a highly recognised spot in the Open teams despite being eligible for the younger age groups.

Special thanks to everyone involved in Southern Touch including coaches, referees and those involved in the development of such a great competition.

5. Competitions Director Report

Team Numbers - Participation levels for all competitions increased across the board for season 2005-06.

Summer Season men's team entries were up from previous summer with 55 teams entered across seven divisions. Women's showed a slight decrease with 35 teams entered across five divisions, mixed competition remained steady with 56 teams stretched across seven divisions.

Junior Touch involving Primary and Secondary schools competitions continued to be popular with 84 teams comparable with last seasons 86. 57 of these were secondary high schools, with the remainder primary. The length of the junior season being 9 weeks is always a focus of Southern Touch that continues to explore avenues where the season can be extended.

Winter touch found it's place again in 2006, returning from a disappointing 2005 where team numbers were significantly low from past seasons, the weather was unfavourable leading to numerous washouts and the overall feel was Winter Touch was seemingly not value for buck!!! Well forget that, in 2006, records were broken, 58 teams entered into the competition 17 men's, 13 women's and the most popular competition in winter mixed with 28 teams 11 more then 2005. The mixed had in fact reached capacity for 2006 and it was only good fortune that everyone had entered in time and could be placed in a division. An alternative night will need to be offered in 2007 to facilitate the growth.

Facilities - Southern Touch continues to provide fantastic sporting facilities to its members both at Wentworth Park and at satellite venue Rugby Park. Ground conditions are comparable to anywhere touch is played in Australia if not better. Southern Touch will continue to work with Tasmanian Rugby and the Clarence City Council to ensure that standards are met and optional improvements can be explored.

By-Laws - Southern Touch continues to alter existing By-laws to improve the quality of competition, and a new by-law to be undertaken for summer 2006-07 places restrictions on elite first division mixed players looking to play down in easier mixed grades rather then sustaining a strong first division competition. It is anticipated that this will ultimately improve the first division mixed standard that has fallen wayside in 2005-06.

Review - A review on a couple of modifications to competitions was undertaken, firstly the combining of first and second division men's and women's for the first four rounds of summer competition. This was trialed for the first time this season and although no major positive outcomes resulted there were no adverse negatives and this format will run again for a second season with a review to follow.

The winter first division men's restrictions entered its second season and overall positive team growth, evenness of competition highlights an effective move. A formal

evaluation of the winter restriction will need to take place and possibly may look to be implemented in the women's competition as teams numbers and diversity of playing standard was a huge factor in the 2006 competition.

Elite competitions – Men's competition remained with just the four teams, being Condors, Phantoms, Pirates and Tigers. Congratulations to Phantoms for ending Condors imposing record, taking out the men's premiership for 2005-06.

Women's took a step forward with six teams being Hurricanes, Condors, Phantoms, Tigers and new comers for the season was Pirates and Bullets.

Mixed continued to be a problem with four teams Condors, Hurricanes and two Phantoms teams, with one realistically not a first division standard side. The amended by-laws will hopefully encourage and introduce a number of new first division mixed sides in 2006-07.

Grading – is no decision that is taken lightly in my capacity, and all divisions are given equal attention and consideration. The nature of grading means that occasionally we might miss the mark, but in the main we get it right and at the end of the day there has to be winners and losers. We do strive extremely hard to satisfy our playing base in terms of the enjoyment of playing touch, some of which comes from that feeling of having a win every now and then.

6. Technical Report

State Cup

Southern Touch achieved mixed results from the State Cup that was held in Devonport in early February. Pleasingly the overall trophy was retained and Southern Touch won the Men's and Women's Opens divisions reasonably comfortably, however three sides suffered upset losses in the grand finals after it seemed likely Southern Touch would take out all six divisions following the round matches.

The preparation for the tournament completed by each team was across the board the best and most professional preparation I believe Southern Touch sides have ever undertaken. This improved preparation, largely through training and the availability and commitment of the player base is a credit to the six coaches involved.

Thanks to the following officials for their efforts prior to and during the State Cup; Brent Mills (men's coach), Pete Cornish (men's manager), Wendy Fiddaman (women's coach), Graeme Fiddaman (women's assistant coach), Shelley Wyver (mixed coach), Daniel Hill (mixed assistant coach), Sean Williams (men's 30's coach), Michael Best (men's 20's coach) and Deb Button (women's 20's coach).

Southern Touch's referees were as usual the standout referees at the tournament, underlined by four of the six referees selected for the Men's and Women's Open finals (Dale Langford, Tom Pilkington, Colin Thompson & Sean Williams) being from Southern Touch.

Referees

The usual availability issues were again prevalent during the 2005/06-summer season. Thursday nights, when mixed competition matches are held at both Wentworth and Rugby Park continues to be the most difficult night to field sufficient referees. Southern Touch staff Phil Mascall and Katherine Dent did a fantastic job managing this situation throughout the season.

The Southern Touch Board slightly increased referee payments from 1st January 2006 as one of the strategies to assist the referee numbers problem, however it will be an ongoing problem that requires constant attention and effort.

The quality of referees within the competition remains high, however this also requires constant attention to ensure standards do not slip. One current concern is the age of most of the better referees in the Association. During 2006/07 more priority must be given to the development of referees with potential under the age of 30.

Coaching

Coaching standards within the Association continue to improve, particularly within the more pro-active of the clubs that take every opportunity to improve themselves. Despite this, it remains disappointing the number of first division players that have ended or are coming to the end of their first division career that are lost to the sport without becoming seriously involved in coaching, particularly in the women's

competition. There are first division sides that seek quality and committed coaches and without people being willing to commit to this area of the sport the club structure that is crucial to the long-term development of the sport will not progress as it could.

Representative

Ben Langford and Emma Haines gained selection in the Crusaders men's and women's open sides respectively and participated at the 2006 National Touch League in Coffs Harbour in March. Despite Ben and Emma's outstanding efforts to gain selection in these sides, it is disappointing that Southern Touch did not increase on its number of five opens representatives in 2005, although the lack of effort from many potential players could also be attributed to the ridiculous elite pathway and selection processes currently presented to players in Touch's 'developing states'.

Emma Haines also attended an Australian Youth Squad training camp in Queensland in January 2006, after gaining selection in the Australian 18's girl's side following her performances at the 18's nationals in September 2005 whilst playing for Tasmania. It is hoped Emma's success and progression to this level leads the way for other Tasmanian's to realise achieving selection at the elite levels of Touch is possible, despite not being based in one of the major states.

A number of other Southern Touch representatives did participate in the Crusaders men's and women's 20's, and Southern Touch fielded the majority of players in the Tasmanian men's sides that traveled to the mainland in November 2005 and again in May 2006. Alarmingly only one Southern Touch player participated in the Tasmanian women's open side that toured in May 2006.

7. Marketing Director Report

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow Board of Management and Association members for their support over the 2005/06 Touch year. This was my first year as a member of the Board of Management and I was made to feel welcome and supported.

This year was a good year for Southern Touch with continued growth in the participation in the 05/06 summer and 06 winter competitions. Touch as a sport continues to grow and expand, and Southern Touch is seeing this correlate to increased membership and player participations.

Southern Touch is thankful for the support of our major sponsors over this time frame in J Boags & Sons, Coca Cola Amtel, WIN Television, Dilger's Caltex Howrah, Sportsco (Eastland's) and our various other business supporters. Moving forward and looking into the future, the Southern Touch Board have been working on a strategic marketing & promotion plan to be engaged for use from the start of the 2006/07 summer competition. This plan covers many areas of the Southern Touch business and is designed to lift the exposure of our association within the sporting community, encourage the participation in Southern Touch competitions and to foster mutually beneficial relationships with external business and sponsor parties. Southern Touch is also looking to increase the value of its membership to members by rolling out updated services and communications via www.southerntouch.com.au web page and other channels. A draft copy of this report is due for completion in August 2006 and will be made available for comment from the membership.

2006/07 looks positive for another successful year for Southern Touch and I wish all our members success in their endeavours with our association over this time.
